




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# THE Curriculum Newsletter

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### **Curriculum Intent**

"How we got to now" is the overriding aim of the History secondary curriculum at Wickersley Partnership Trust (WPT). Through a shared understanding and knowledge of our past history, we aim to give our students the ability to understand who they are and their place in the world. We aim to inspire a love of learning and the ability to ask questions.

Our History curriculum allows our students to ask and develop perceptive questions to help them understand the past and the present. In an ever-changing world, History allows our students to look to past examples, learn from them and ensure that as citizens we do not make the same mistakes that those before us may have done.

The History curriculum aims to give students a coherent knowledge and understanding of Britain's past and that of the wider world. It inspires students' curiosity to know more about the past.

Teaching equips students to ask enquiring questions, think critically, weigh evidence, sift arguments, and develop perspective and judgement.

History helps students to understand the complexity of people's lives, the process of change, the diversity of societies and relationships between different groups, as well as their own identity and the challenges of their time.

### Year 13 Curriculum

History is delivered via two 80 minute lessons per week. In Year 13, we look at the following topics, click on the two components below to find out more!

Component 1: Breadth Study - The Tudors: England, 1485-1547

Part two: England: Turmoil and Triumph, 1547-1603

This course focuses on Henry VIII's children – Edward VI, Mary Tudor and Elizabeth I. Students will consider the problems of succession, relations with foreign powers, religious and social changes during their reigns.

Component 2: Depth Study - Democracy and Nazism: Germany, 1918-1933

Part two: Nazi Germany, 1933-1945

This course focuses on Hitler's consolidation of power, the Terror State and economic and social policies. Students will also look at the Racial State, anti-Semitism and the treatment of Jews. They will finish off looking at the impact of the Second World War.

Component 3: Historical Investigation - personal study of approx. 100 years

Students also have to complete a personal study based on a topic of student's choice. This has to take the form of a question in the context of approximately 100 years. This will culminate in a 3500-4500 word essay completed by Christmas of Year 13. Current topic choices are:

- Causes of the Russian Revolution
- Fall of the Roman Empire
- Nationalism as a cause of conflict 1815-1914
- Growth of universal suffrage in Britain
- European witchcraft in the 15th and 16th centuries

Allowing our students to see that History is a subject which opens up doors to many career opportunities is also an integral part of our students' preparation for life beyond sixth form.




### What is Antisemitism?
